Latest News on the Clubhouse Alterations

Members will be pleased to know that planning approval (with conditions) has now finally been granted for the major alterations and extensions to the clubhouse.

You will note that the approval has some conditions attached of which one is a little unusual so, for information, members will now have the facility to park their bicycles (yes really). I'm sure this is to encourage members' fitness (try carrying your golf bag on a bike). Others are, no live music will be allowed on the patio (so no singing please either) and the balcony cannot be used after 9.00pm.

Planning is the first and perhaps most important hurdle achieved but there are still many other requirements that have to be addressed such as building regulations, procurement of quantity surveyors, structural engineers and contractors before work can commence.

It is hoped that work will be able to start on site in late summer and will last for at least 5 to 6 months, if all goes according to plan.

It was hoped that the alterations would have been under way by now but the previous plans that you saw had to be altered dramatically in order that we meet the demands for the future of the Club.

The main alterations in brief consist of removal of the conservatory and construction of a substantial golf sports injury facility together with a large extension to the clubhouse lounge, to include a balcony across the whole of the new extensions which will give members a much needed view over the course and the formation of a new patio where the putting green is currently. Other works in brief will include a doubling in size of the men's changing room area, formation of a meeting room together with an enlarged golf shop and improvements to the ladies' facilities.

With all this proposed work in all areas of the clubhouse there will be some disruption at times to the operating of the clubhouse although we hope it will not necessitate any closure so please bear with us when the work starts.

In addition to all the development work that is ongoing with the course, this a massive investment in the club from the owners and shows their continued commitment, investment and faith in promoting its long-term future.

PRESENTATION NIGHT 2022

Finally, after 3 long years we were able to hold a Presentation Evening at the Golf Club. It was very well-attended and there were favourable reports on the evening from the Members.

A FEW BASIC RULES

Teeing Off

You must tee the ball up **behind** the line created by the tee markers. It can be anywhere between the two markers and as far back as the length of two drivers.

Playing the Hole

You must play the ball as it lies and not move it.

You cannot make the lie better, by pressing down the surface behind the ball or breaking or bending branches to make it easier to hit the ball.

You can pick up sticks, stones, leaves, rocks, boulders, feathers, dead grass, pine needles that are around your ball, but make sure not to move your ball, otherwise that's a penalty.

Out of Bounds

A ball hit outside the course boundary (usually marked by white stakes) must be replayed from where your previous shot was taken, adding ONE penalty stroke.

In Bunkers

Do not ground your club.

Do not rake or use your fingers to test the sand before your shot.

You can remove impediments like leaves and stones.

Dropping the ball

Stand up straight and bend from the waist to drop the ball from knee height. If you ball rolls into the hazard, or area where you are dropping from, retrieve and drop again. If after TWO drops and the ball still rolls into the hazard or area, then you can place it.

On the Green

You can move away loose impediments eg stones, sand, gravel or leaves on your line

You are allowed to repair almost any damage on the green, such as spike marks, ball marks, indentations from a club or flagstick and animal damage, but NOT aerations holes, natural surface imperfections or natural wear of the hole.

You cannot test the surface of the green by scraping, rubbing or rolling the ball across it.

SENIOR CAPTAIN'S REPORT

Hello, my name is Kevin Daly and I am the Wishaw Golf Club Seniors Captain.

I have been requested to complete an article on the first few months of my Captaincy.

Paul Williams the Club Captain has explained how the Seniors are run. It is in the Captains Log Vol 2 page 4, and is well worth a read.

As Paul has mentioned the Seniors play 14 Inter Club matches home and away, travelling north to Mickelover in Derbyshire and south to Whitefields between Coventry and Rugby. To date we have played 11 matches winning 3 and losing 8. We are currently on a losing streak of 5 matches.

The Seniors play 6 rounds of Senior Player of the Year (SPOTY). Three rounds are played at Wishaw and three away. The three away days are chosen by the Captain, Treasurer and the Secretary. After completing all six rounds, the players eliminate their worst two rounds, only their best four rounds count, this then gives us our SPOTY. After two rounds of SPOTY the leader at present is Stuart Thompson on 66 points.

The Captain's away day was played at Willesley Park, Ashby de la Zouch and the Treasurer's away day will be played at Walmley Golf Club in July.

The Secretary's away day will be played at Ullesthorpe Golf Club Leicestershire.

Finally, the Seniors have an Open in September and seniors from other courses are encouraged to enter. To qualify as a Senior you have to be 55 or over.
