
WISHAW GOLF CLUB WORLD

SUMMER LEAGUE IS BACK!

This Club Major is to be run again this year but, following last year's disappointing level of entries, the format is changing. It will be a singles competition, rather than the doubles format of last year which discouraged many from taking part due to the problems of arranging fourballs. As last year, it will be played over eight weeks from 30th May to 20th July on the Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday of each week with different formats for each week, Stableford, Bogey, Medal and Murphy's. Each of the format swill appear twice and there will be a sheet explaining the 'Murphy's' format attached to the score card. The best four cards for each player will count towards their league points so you do not have to play each week.

If you would like to play in this, please register with the Club Shop by 1st June. Registration costs $\pounds 4$ and each round you play will cost $\pounds 3$. Before playing each round, please register with the Shop and return your cards there afterwards.

As it is a Club Major, you will need to have the minimum 6 qualifying cards in before each round you play.

It is hoped that this format will encourage more players to take part so please give it a go. Apart from the exciting prospect of getting your name on the Honours Boards, you will also find out just what 'Murphy's' is!

VIEW FROM THE LADIES' LOCKER ROOM

It is recorded that one of the first lady golfers was Mary, Queen of Scots in the 1500s. During her reign, the famous St Andrews Links Golf Course was built. Mary was credited with creating the term "Caddie", derived from "Cadets", used by her when referring to assistants. Unfortunately, she had her head chopped off by her cousin, Elizabeth 1st before she could get her handicap down to single figures!



At the end of the 19th century, a Scottish judge suggested women should only drive the ball 70 or 80 yards as the posture for a full swing was not particularly graceful when the player is clad in female dress.

It has been a male-dominated sport for longer than women have been allowed to play. It still is, with more professional competitions and better prize money for the men. Women still have a long way to go to catch up.

The LPGA was founded in the 1950s by Helen Hicks. Fourteen tournaments were held during its first season. Today, thirty-three tournaments are held each season.

Things are finally looking brighter in the 21st century. Women are more accepted on golf courses and given new opportunities.

That said, many of our local golf clubs still do not encourage women to play on Saturday mornings, calling them "the gentlemen's medal or stableford competition day", thereby only allowing women to play later in the day. Not much good in the winter months!

We are therefore, extremely lucky at Wishaw to have the luxury of playing at any time on any day and being encouraged to enter club competitions for all, but due to the difficulty of the course we unfortunately do not have a very big ladies' section. However the challenges of our course enable us to tackle numerous courses with confidence.

This season we have again achieved fantastic results, not only in our club competitions, but also in external competitions. Our final competition of the season was the 'Mad Hatters' three clubs and a putter. Due to the adverse weather, this was held partly in the simulator studio together with an indoor putting competition which made for a fun afternoon. Congratulations go to Margaret Howitt on winning the Teapot.

I thank all the ladies for their support and my congratulations go to all the ladies who have had success in qualifying or winning any of our competitions and wish all the incoming Captains a very successful year.
